Thank you all who have renewed your membership for 2022. If you haven't yet please think about renewing. Your membership dues keep the doors open.

We have received another grant from The Alfred Z. Solomon Charitable Trust for a permanent exhibit: Mt. Pleasant Glassworks to Saratoga, Product and People educating visitors on the impact of this local industry. We have contracted a professional exhibitor, Paul Orselli, to guide us in this project. Interior painting is complete and our eyes have turned to the third floor. Currently it is an unheated space but board members have there sights on an elevator to allow access for additional exhibits. So stay tuned!

We have watched the JRM Artists' Gallery on the second floor thrive and receive regional recognition. We survived the pandemic and came out solvent.. Glass is composed of silica (soda ash), lime and sand. This creates a dark green color. This green color varies depending on impurities, oxidation or added iron. Clear glass is pure silica

(99.9%) and with higher temperatures and availability of pure silica it was more expensive. Other colors occur when different compounds are aadded.




Wyoming

This whiskey is embossed with W.A. GAINES HP. Hynds & CO'S OLD CROW WHISKEY CHEYENNE. WYO and in the center is embossed THE CAPITAL. (Not referring to the capital of Wyoming but the name of a bar). This bottle is machine made so it was made after 1906. This still puts it in the early years of Statehood which was in 1890.



Digs and Stories from the Desk of Roy Topka



A third suspected spot was not a privy but ash fill from a pipe connection.

The following week there was a small dilemma to deal with. The 1860's hole from the other week which I could not dig the whole thing out due to a Jersey barrier that if undermined could fall on my head. In the past week construction had taken out the house foundation and concrete pad that was on the other side of the privy. The Jersey barrier was still where it was. The big problem was tons of sand was brought in and filled the foundation void. Do I move a huge amount of sand in the hopes of finding a bottle or two in the far end of the privy? You betcha!!

To make a long dig short, I went down 9' and didn't find a thing except shards. This is the nature of the beast. After I started filling in I decided to take a picture, it's hard to see how much sand was actually moved, but it all had to be put back. A few days after Christmas found me back in an area built up around 1870. Privies had been dug here but not enough to account for the amount of houses. A narrow pit was located that was mid 1870's and I was able to find three Common aqua Albany squats and a Knowles Insect Destroyer. Just a side point, how many bottles are out there that destroy things? Anyways, that was it for 2021.

Two weeks into the new year found myself sticking my probe through leaves into frost free ground, locating a c. 1900 privy. The 6' pit was devoid of anything, including shards, until in a bottom corner I located a complete Radam's Microbe killer jug. Now these things aren't rare pieces, but in 53 years of digging I never found a whole Radam's anything. Well, this could be it for a while, spring come soon!

Adelbert M. Foster Desk Donated

The National Bottle Museum has received the donation of the roll top desk, fully restored, of Adelbert M. Foster. Born in Stoddard, NH in 1859 he joined his father in the glass business when he was 13. He



owned and operated multiple glass manufacturing companies before combining his interests in the Foster-Forbes Glass Company in 1929 at Marion, Indiana. Eventually the company was bought by National Can Company in 1970 but retained the Foster-Forbes name. More recently it was purchased by Saint Gobain.

This desk was restored by the Foster

family and is currently located at the home of Adelbert's great grandson. The museum is creating a research area on the second floor of the museum where this desk will reside. We Thank the Foster family for this piece of history.


