

This Hoosier Fruit Jar is the state bottle for Indiana. The base is embossed with the name of is distributor, HOLLWEG & REESE, INDLS,IND (odd abbreviation!). The glass screw lid is embossed PATD SEPT 12TH 1882 JAN 3D 1883 HOOSIER JAR. It has three lugs on the side and makes a shoulder seal for the ground lip jar.

PART 11 (Continued from winter newsletter)

It was now February 25th, and I'm definitely sure my luck, in terms of both the weather and finding bottles, would soon run out. I started In on the next buried pile of rocks, barely able to move in the tiny open space. The only bottles that survived were a few pontil slicks and pontiled Nowills Pectorals.



The other side only a few slicks survived. March arrived with some snow but not enough to stop digging. The next hole was a relief, an easy to dig 1870's woody with mostly druggists and some J & IEM turtles. More probing turned up the last of the stone lined pits. You could

feel the open space inside with the probe and thank goodness when I opened one side the walls were pushed inward, but were intact, leading to more whole bottles from each end. This was the wettest of the stones, and the extra space allowed me to maneuver to bail water.




No rare bottles came out, but a good cross section of pontil bottles: pepper sauce, blue lipped stoneware, green Boardman, Rogers Liverwort & Tar, Davis Inflammatory Extirpator, plus a bunch of others. Sadly this was the



end of the good holes. The next four pits were 1890 - early 1900's producing sparse bottles. Never did get that dreaded snowstorm! All in all it was a good run. Good collecting and digging to everyone.



Anatomy of a Saratoga-Type Bottle


In 1823, John Clarke and his partner Thomas Lynch began bottling mineral water from the Congress Spring in Saratoga Springs, N.T. The owners of the Mt. Vernon glassworks in Oneida County, N.Y. entered into a 25-year contract with John Clarke in the early 1840s to produce bottles with the stipulation that the factory be moved closer to Saratoga Springs. The new factory became known as the Mt. Pleasant or Saratoga Mountain Glass Works. By 1866 the glass factory was located closer yet to the city, and became known as the Congress and Empire or Congressville Glassworks.

The bottles produced at the Mt. Vernon Glass Works and other nearby factories became known as the Saratoga-Type Bottle.

Between 1823 and 1889 mineral waters from approximately 30 springs in Saratoga County were bottled

The museum is not subsidized, but raises all of its own funds and is governed by an elected volunteer Board of Trustees, operating under universally accepted museum policies. The Museum is a member of the Ballston Spa Business and Professional Association, the Southern Saratoga County Chamber of Commerce, and the Museum Association of New York.

Members receive a quarterly newsletter containing information on the museum, and the history of glass bottle manufacturing, identification, and collecting. Each June, the Museum sponsors a Bottle Show & Sale known as "The Saratoga Show" which attracts enthusiasts from coast to coast in the United States and several provinces of Canada.
