STATE BOTTLE— Missouri

Cider companies in St. Louis, Missouri only existed for a short time during the 1870s. One such company was The Jos. Werner & Company located at 1324 - 27 South 7th Street. The site today is occupied by a Convention Center. Their amber ciders are rare but the National Bottle Museum's bottle has one of only three olive green bottles known to be in existence, according to Verna Wagner. (collector)



The bottle is embossed with OHIO CIDER, Jos. Werner & Co St Louis, Mo.

It had to be strong and tough to contain a fermented beverage and survive the rigors of pre 20th century travel. In the early 1800's bottles for beer, ale, porter and cider were usually from cheap black or green glass—called junk bottles. Today, we treasure their beautiful colors and hand crafted looks.



This February, the Ballston Spa Business and Professional Association hosted its 11th annual Chocolate Fest in the Village of Ballston Spa. The National Bottle Museum opened its doors to chocolate and visitors. We welcomed over 300 visitors for the event. From comments overheard, the majority of visitors were first timers!

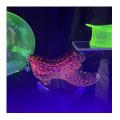

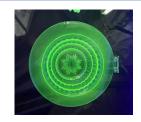

A Youthful Perspective.....

Sophie Kaspar, a junior at The Hotchkiss School, would like to study Art Conservation and Global Sustainability

On Thanksgiving Day 2022, while most people were carving turkey and passing around family traditions, my grandmother, Ellie Dillon, brought me to the National Bottle Museum. Instead of a crowded dining table, I found myself in a hushed room bathed in light, surrounded by hand-blown glass bottles that shimmered like tiny artifacts frozen in time.

Walking through the museum, I couldn't look away from the vibrant colors and delicate forms of the bottles. As an artist, I saw more than functional containers. These were masterpieces—crafted with precision, meant to endure, each one whispering stories of its time. The way light refracted through the glass, the imperfect curves, the fragile strength—it all felt like poetry. When you view objects as an artist, they demand more from you: they ask you to see beauty, purpose, and legacy all at once. I couldn't stop wondering: when did we stop valuing things like this? Glass bottles, so durable, reusable, and beautiful, have been part of human history for millennia. Yet somewhere in the mid-20th century, we exchanged them for plastic: light, cheap, disposable. Revolutionary, yes, but now we're drowning in its aftermath. How did we let go of something so timeless, so sustainable?

That Thanksgiving visit hasn't left me. Since then, I've been painting a still life inspired by the museum's collection, a way to immortalize those bottles and imagine a world where we cherish what we create. Each brushstroke feels like a quiet rebellion against the culture of disposability, an ode to a time when beauty and practicality coexisted. The deeper I dived into this project, the clearer it's become: plastic isn't just a material—it's a mindset. It's convenience at the expense of care, a trade-off my generation now wrestles with. Standing in that museum, I realized the solution isn't just about recycling or replacing plastic. It's about fundamentally rethinking how we create and consume. It's about choosing what lasts, valuing what we make, and intertwining beauty and sustainability once more.

That quiet dialogue—born in a room full of glowing bottles—hasn't stopped. I hope it never does. Maybe it's that whisper of insight that will guide us toward a future where our creations, like those glass bottles, stand as reflections of our best selves.



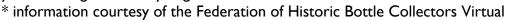
DIGS AND STORIES FROM ROY TOPKA'S SHOVEL

A prerequisite to being a bottle digger is the enjoyment of not knowing. You have to understand it is a blessing. If you knew what lay under foot you might never dig. So it was the last quarter of 2024 I lined up a series of digs, plus spur of the moment spots, ending up digging I5 privies before January Ist. You never know how a dig will end up, but experience gives you a rough idea. Out of several c 1865 - 1875 pits the best find was only one aqua Hennessy & Nolan 1876 Ginger ale. The next 4 pits, one after the other, all had one thing in common: all were converted into flushers, meaning modern plumbing was installed. These privies. All located near to or attached to the backs of their respective houses, served until a proper indoor toilet was installed.

One of the pits wasn't filled in until the 1920's. It's not unusual to find a converted pit. Digging four in a row is. All of these pits did not have a good feel to them, but you dig them anyway, as you just don't know what could be in there. More pits were dug with the best stuff being a Warner's and

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some local gravitating stopper bottles. The last holes of the year, just before Christmas, went pontiled but void of bottles. One interesting pontil was found, embossed simply "H. W & Co / N.Y." This is for Heath Wynkoop & Company, listed in business from 1855 - 1862, as Perfumers.* So that was it for the year. Probing has already begun for 2025.

NEW EXHIBIT!

When we closed in early January to refurbish the museum, we created several new exhibits. Here is one of them!

SPOUTING SPRINGS

Just South of Saratoga Springs multiple mineral water wells were drilled that produced large fountains of water. The area became known as "The Geysers". Underground carbonic acid gas is what powered the geysers. By 1900 widespread extraction of the gas itself led to a depletion of some springs. In 1909 New York State took over control of many of the wells in order to protect the resource. These bottles and images represent activity from 1870 to present. Many of the earlier bottles displayed were made in the Congressville Glass Works a short distance away.
